


HOW SHOULD A LIBERAL DEMOCRACY REACT TO CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTION CLAIMS?

Kimberley Brownlee is Canada Research Chair in Ethics and Political & Social Philosophy at the University of British Columbia. Her current work focuses on loneliness, belonging, social human rights, and interactional ethics. Her other work focuses on conscience, conviction, and principled disobedience of the law. She is the author of Being Sure of Each Other (Oxford 2020) and Conscience and Conviction: The Case for Civil Disobedience (Oxford 2012).

Katherine Furman is the Philosophy, Politics and Economics Lecturer at the University of Liverpool. Prior to this she was the director of the MA in Health and Society at University College Cork in Ireland. She works broadly on Philosophy and Health policy, with a special interest in relationships between experts and laypeople, and on health policy development. She did her PhD in Philosophy at the London School of Economics on AIDS denialism in South Africa.

Bert Gordijn is Professor and Director of the Institute of Ethics at Dublin City University. He is also Secretary of the European Society for Philosophy of Medicine and Healthcare and President of the International Association of Education in Ethics.
